Ask a Nurse

Question - It has been so cold lately, how do I stay warm and still save on heating bills?

Answer - We have had unusually cold weather this year. As people age, they become more sensitive to the changes in temperature. Here are some tips to stay warm until spring arrives:

- 1. Look around your house for cold air leaking under the doors or windows. Use a rolled towel in front of these spaces.
- 2. Call SDG&E for information on lower rates if you have a chronic illness. Your doctor will have to sign a special form.
- 3. Buy a space heater that has been approved by the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Do not place it near curtains, beds or other things that can catch fire.
- 4. Light your fireplace for extra warmth, as long as it has been inspected for safety.
- 5. Close the doors to any rooms you are not using.
- 6. Insulate your water heater and water pipes.
- 7. Open the blinds or curtains during the day and let the sunlight in.
- 8. Have your furnace inspected to make sure it is working properly.
- 9. Clean air vents and replace any filters.
- 10. Move around every day to help your blood circulate, which will make you feel warmer.
- 11. Use an electric blanket. If you have a sleeping partner, buy a dual control model, which means each person can control the temperature on their side of the bed.
- 12. Wear layers of clothing such as thermal underwear, an undershirt, thick socks, a warm hat, scarf, gloves and warm boots when going out. If you come home in wet clothes, change out of them as soon as possible.
- 13. Go to your doctor if you are unusually cold all the time, perhaps there is a health problem that needs to be checked.
- 14. Sleeping with your pets may keep you warmer. Be sure they are clean and free from fleas and ticks.
- 15. Talk with a neighbor or close friend and make a pact to check on each other every day.
- 16.Please don't be afraid to ask for help. Your local senior center or church is a good place to start.
